Joining the dots in Youth Services

Mapping and Strategy Workshop

5<sup>th</sup> June 2007 Discussion and Outcomes Report

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#### Introduction

Nineteen *youth services* professionals, representing 15 different agencies, attended and participated in the Wimmera Regional Youth Affairs Network service mapping and strategy workshop held on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2007. The Wimmera PCP sponsored this workshop.

Another 7 agencies provided information prior to the workshop which could be shared and used. A participant list can be found at Attachment 1.

The specific objectives of this workshop included:

- To share information across the network regarding the range (breadth and depth) of youth services in the Wimmera catchment area;
- To discuss individual and shared visions for youth services within the Wimmera catchment area;
- To undertake an analysis of the current youth service offerings against the needs of our youth; and
- To develop workable solutions to the most critical challenges and gaps within the youth service system

The following report identifies the key discussion points, agreed outcomes and decisions reached throughout this workshop.

#### **Discussion Points & Outcomes**

## 1. Opening and Introductions

Significant time was invested at the beginning of the workshop for participants to formally introduce themselves to other professionals, following welcoming comments from Donna Bridge, Wimmera PCP.

These introductions were facilitated through using common prompts such as: Name, role, agency; length of experience working in Youth Services; and working in the Wimmera; 1 achievement, challenge, learning in recent times; critical issues / needs facing our Youth in the Wimmera Region; and Aspirations for Youth Services in the Wimmera Region.

Arising from these introductions were several noteworthy points. These included:

- There was a collective and diverse approximate 310 years of experience within the youth services field and an approximate 170 years of experience working in the Wimmera, amongst the professionals at the workshop.

- Critical issues / needs facing the youth in the Wimmera Region were recorded as:
  - Geography to be covered within the Wimmera
  - Capacity to meet needs in rural Victoria x 2
  - Welfare depended families moving to cheaper housing in rural Victoria
  - Co-ordination of services
  - Capacity to work strategically
  - Critical mass advocacy / awareness
  - Transportation access to x 7
  - Accommodation youth housing 14 18 yrs
  - Drugs and alcohol (alcohol causes more harm) x 3
  - Resources and funding wide spread x 3
  - People attitude to youth
  - Isolation
  - Lack of appropriate role models
  - Individual activities more of team more choices
  - Earlier intervention / earlier referrals (D&A; family breakdown etc;)

- Attracting youth to our programs / services (particularly for males)
- Aging population families / youth moving away
- Not enough to do in local towns
- Facilitating keeping families together
- Parental abuse / sibling abuse / young people to parents
- Violent relationships
- Having the time
- Being reactive
- Social justice and fair share of resources mis-diagnosis
- Youth mental health self harm
- Aspirations for Youth Services within the Wimmera were recorded as
  - Young people's issues prioritised
  - Tertiary intervention
  - Wholistic approach
  - Return of generalist youth workers x 4
  - Rural kids are worthy increased self esteem within our youth
  - Keep Wimmera Youth in the community
  - Assist young people to meet aspirations/ goals and reach them with supports
  - That we don't miss Wimmera's 'at risk' children / youth
  - Bucket of \$ to regions to enact a 5 year plan
  - Increased employment opportunities: make a difference
  - Increased mentoring / role modelling programs x 2
  - Improved functional families: great parenting
  - More activities increased choices
  - Becoming more accessible and known
  - Improved drop-in facilities
  - Warm beds; full tummies
  - Cut off dependence on Drugs and alcohol x 2
  - Greater youth involvement / participation
  - Earlier intervention focus on healthy relationships x 3
  - Parenting services x 2
  - Improved potential young people's relationships
  - Increase public profile of young people for their diversity
  - Increase our proactive work
  - Education of binge drinking for young people and their parents
- Common themes emerged regarding things that attracted people to work in this field. These included: preventative focus of work; opportunity to facilitate positive change in young people's and their families' lives; and enjoyment of working with young people and watching them reach for their potential / improve their lives.

## 2. Serving Youth within Wimmera - our reality

Significant time was also invested in mapping the youth services represented at the workshop and those agencies that provided their information prior to the workshop. In total 62 pieces / plates of service information were mapped.

These services were mapped onto a matrix, with the horizontal axis representing the Age Continuum (12 - 18; 12 - 25; 18+; other specific age groups; Parents of Youth; and Miscellaneous) and the vertical axis representing the continuum of intervention (primary, secondary and / or tertiary).

The end product of this mapping has been reproduced in Attachment 2 & Attachment 3.

3. The mapping of youth services stimulated significant discussion. Professionals were encouraged to reflect on the map and their experiences and to consider strengths, limitations, gaps, service duplication, challenges; and opportunities for effective partnerships and service improvement.

The following is a record of these discussions.

## Things that were noticed

- Lots of services we didn't know about
- Gap in generalist youth workers
- Basic coverage regarding education but minimum no more on top of this
- Agencies / services have become very specific regarding eligibility criteria
- Snapshot map doesn't include the geographic dimension
- Map also doesn't represent capacity such as some services operate only 2 days per week
- Services don't reach as far in some areas
- Training gap regarding new legislation for helping youth workers regarding brain development etc;
- Cultural gaps in Art and sport services
- Gaps in service system for same sex services for youth
- No job placement, education and training service
- Need more mentoring programs
- LGAs don't get the breadth of services needed
- Service gap for 9 11 year old age group

## 4. Our analysis

Through a series of group processes, the strengths, weakness, opportunities and threats were analysed (SWOT analysis) according to the group's experience (issues / needs ) and the Wimmera youth services map.

The following is a record of each of the groups work.

<u>Group 1 –</u> Focussed on Two specific issues and the general gaps in youth services within the Wimmera catchment. The following is a record of this work.

## Issue 1: Capacity to work strategically

Strengths	Weaknesses

- Lack of knowledge of other services / communication around services

- Value and recognition of networking
- Value-driven service delivery outcomes to be met
- Lack of use of technology re communication / teleconferencing
- Need fewer coordinators and more workers on the ground (service delivery)

#### Opportunities

- Technology to have meetings via teleconference to save on time and travel
- Accessibility to people in the community

#### Threats

- Few workers who are involved in planning
- Workers have to do planning on top of 'hands on' work
- Less clarity around work and personal boundaries
- Competition for funding
- De-qualifying ourselves few avenues for education in youth on local basis such as Certificate IV Youth Work
- Tyranny of distance for education to up-skill workers in this area
- Recruitment and retention and short term funding
- Quality driven in area of Youth Work
- Saying 'No' presents and issue around integrity – may impact on being granted funding in the region or missing out altogether
- Conflict regarding what can realistically be delivered

## 5. Shared vision for youth in the Wimmera – 3 year outlook

Building on this analysis and a review of aspirations recorded earlier in the workshop, several visions for the youth in Wimmera were put forward. These included:

- a. Respected, resourceful and retained (yellow Wrist Band)
- b. Wimmera Youth empowered, resilient, skilled, happy, positive role models, belonging
- c. Wimmera youth healthy, respected, respectful, retained (be here!), happy / confident, excel, transportation

After further discussion, a shared vision for Wimmera Youth was agreed. Namely:

#### Wimmera Youth:

- Valued
- Respected
- Listened to

It was also agreed that the most critical 3 issues need to be addressed to progress closer to shared vision.

## 6. Enacting our vision – critical issues to be addressed

Following this discussion and agreement of a shared vision, professionals identified a series of critical issues that needed to be addressed to progress the WRYAN closer to its shared vision. The following is a list of these issues:

- Revisit WRYAN's role: Terms of Reference etc given the high representation of members and discussion at workshop
- Develop, implement and evaluate a regional youth strategy that covers all age groups (with 10 – 12; 12 – 18 and 18 – 25 year old age groupings.)
  - One of the key underpinnings of this strategy is empowering youth skills development.
  - The strategy will address the issues of youth participation/ engagement / involvement and for all to understand 'relevance'.
  - The strategy needs to also address the community's attitude towards youth.
  - The strategy also needs to address the goal of strengthening / promoting pathways for access to youth services
  - The strategy also needs to address the issue of succession planning – community pathways – a strategy to keep communities strong and solid

## 7. Closing

The forum closed with closing words from Donna Bridge, Wimmera PCP, thanking all for their contribution and commitment and reaching agreement that the next WRYAN meeting (July) is dedicated to review the outcomes and discussion arising from the workshop.

Outcomes and discussion report to be prepared by facilitator and distributed through Donna.

The next WRYAN meeting will also discuss how to progress the review of the WRYAN's Terms of Reference etc; and the next steps regarding regional strategy development.


